DEMONSTRATION: Bradley McAllister demonstrated his techniques for turning and coloring his wood pieces.

He uses Aniline Dyes in powder form using water as the solvent. A digital scale available from Harbor Freight is used to measure out the very small amounts of the powder dyes and water to correct proportions; Bradley indicated he often mixes his dyes to 25 or 50 per cent of the recommended ratios so that he can control the resulting density of color.

Take care to avoid cross-contamination of your dyes and wear and change gloves as you mix and apply the dyes.

As you turn your piece remember that 'details' such as beads and grooves will complicate the coloring process. Stick with simple shapes and smooth surfaces sanded to about 220 grit.

Bradley uses Lacquer finishes and demonstrated ways to apply color dyes over first coats of lacquer to give 'depth' to the colors and allow special color patterns.

Automotive polishes are used after the lacquer has hardened to reach a high gloss and deep finish result.

# **Lathe Safety Tips**

## Safe use of the woodturning lathe

While turning wood, you are unavoidably in close proximity to a rotating piece of wood attached to a machine. This presents a number of hazards but these can be controlled or minimized with a common sense approach. Develop good habits and stick with them!

- Check your speed When you mount a fresh piece of wood on the lathe, make sure the lathe speed is set to be slow enough so the lathe won't vibrate dangerously. Refer to the safe speed formula; RPM = 6,000/D to 9,000/D.
- Position the tool rest close enough to the work piece to provide adequate support.
- Before you start the lathe, always rotate the work piece by hand to ensure it does not catch on the tool rest.
- Don't balance tools on your lathe that might fall off and injure you. Keep them in a rack and use just the one in your hand. Think about a sharp tool falling point first onto your bare foot; wear good shoes.
- Keep your fingers away from the rotating wood and don't hang your fingers over the tool rest.
- Whenever possible, don't stand directly in line with the rotating wood so if it comes loose, or if part of it breaks off, you aren't in the firing line. A face shield will help but even so you could still be injured if the speed was too high.
- · If you are turning pieces of wood with

- glue joints, ensure the joint is secure and use a lower lathe speed as a precaution.
- If you use cyanoacrylate (CA) glue for crack / gap filling, make sure the glue is dry before turning the lathe on.

  Sometimes a surface skin can form but the glue beneath can still be liquid. Once it sticks to your visor, it is virtually impossible to remove. You were wearing a visor weren't you?
- When sanding, don't wrap the abrasive around your fingers and do use with your fingers trailing the direction of rotation.
- Remember "Anchor, Bevel, Cut" each time you bring up a tool to the work.
